One final note - after the photo shoot for this month's featured Volkswagens the Lewis' traded Tweety ion, but never fear, they traded her for a Passat!





to go except for one thing ... me. We have just finished up nearly a week camping in the beautiful High Country of North Carolina. This year's High Country Bus Festival was a good one. In spite of the sporadic rain, the weather couldn't have been better; mid 80's in the day and low 60's in the evenings. Almost 175 buses ranging from Split Windows to Eurovans scattered the hillside at the Grandfather Mountain RV Campground for the weekend campout.

Every year, during the last weekend of July, I know what I am doing. I don't have to worry about plans for that weekend. It's just a given. I don't think I have missed this campout in over 5 years. And in that time, there have been numerous changes. Let's see...the first year, 1998, I think, it was just Linda and I. We knew that everyone generally gets a site in the field with all the other buses. But we wanted to be different and got a pull-in site in the midst of several RVs. Electric and water hookups and close access to the bathrooms were a draw to our decision of where to camp. It was great having electricity, but being surrounded by non-VW RVs was not so great. Plus, there was no shade.

The next year, in 1999, we ended up going to a Phish concert in Atlanta instead of High Country (priorities, priorities!), and Linda was seven months pregnant (I know, go to a concert but not a campout, go figure!) so let's skip to the following year, 2000. Our daughter, Talia, was born in August of 1999, so we were no longer a duo...we were now a trio.We got a pull in site again, but this time it was at the top of the field, in the last pull in site available. We couldn't have gotten closer to the bathrooms and showers than that! But we started thinking that maybe shade would be better than having electricity. I mean, if the air around you is warm, all a fan does is push that warm air around. At least if it was shady, the air would be cooler. We started looking that year for another site in the shade.

Let's move forward to 2001. This time, we got a site at the top of the field, next to a creek that flows down the far side of the field. No electricity, water access was a few more feet away, and the bathroom required more steps to get there, but there was some shade. We were a little closer to the general crowd, and felt more at home being closer to the buses, and not circled by RVs. We met new people and reunited with friends we had made the times before. You know those kind of friends...you see them only at VW events...but you enjoy seeing them each and every time.

Ok. Skip forward to 2002. We camped in the same general area, only a few sites down from the previous year. Still no electricity, water and bathrooms were even further away, but it was still shady. Talia was older and able to get around without Mommy or Daddy having to carry her around as much. Not only did we make and reunite with friends, Talia started meeting other children and playing with



them as well. So now it added another dimension to the weekend...Talia meeting and making friends that will hopefully last a long time. While we were there, we decided to scout out a great camping spot for the future. While walking around, noticing the ups and downs of some of our preferred sites, we met these people that had several buses on their campsite, not in the field with everybody else, in the shade, near the bathrooms, and best of all, the site had electricity. While making conversation, Linda and I looked at each other and knew that this was the site we wanted for the next year. Perfect!

The next year, in 2003, that is just what we

did. We got the site that we wanted. We soon found out that we could fit more than two buses on that site. We managed to squeeze four buses (all with side tents or awnings!) onto our allotted space. It was perfect. Of course, we did the usual meeting and greeting, how-are-you and how-you-been, just like always. This time, we had our newborn, Trey, along with us. Our trio had become a guartet. People that we had met ever since our first High Country campout referred to our ever changing lives...they commented on how things were different since that first year. They were right. How our lives had changed!

In 2004, we got the same campsite again. Only this time, there were only three buses on our site, so there was more room for spreading out. Talia, who was four years old at the time, had moved from hiding behind our

legs while meeting people to leading the conversation after "Hello". She also wanted to go play with kids at their campsites. We have let her do that before, but it's hard to let go of your children that way...how do you what are they doing and most importantly, where they are doing it? It's a big campground and an even bigger world outside of the campground. 

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
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cooled Beetle was because "it's an automatic!" Lamar and Cindy are the original owners of Tweety, who has racked up 48,000 miles on the road.



isfied both my Coca-Cola collecting and VW toy collecting when I bought a Matchbox Collector Series Volkswagen Van.



## Off The Board... Notes, news and points of interest from the club internet forum



#### **Zen** Posted: Sep. 3 2004, 8:17am

Most of you know by now that I sometimes might have a very, very slight tendency to come up with "creative" ways to get a vehicle back on the road.

Sometimes my work amazes myself. Like the time I repaired the rear universal joint on my Chevy truck drive shaft with the piston from a bus wheel cylinder ... say what you want about that one, but it got me from 40 miles south of the Georgia/Florida state line to just north of Macon. It also got me from the middle of nowhere with no cell phone service to civilization and cell phone service. Since Joy had to make two round trips in one day to rescue me (one to come get me and the drive shaft so I could repair it CORRECT-LY and another to take me back to install it), it was pretty significant that I got about two and half hours closer to home.

With Kyle's help, on the way to Birmingham last year we figured out that a lug bolt will suffice for an oil drain plug if you use the proper seals with it ... the proper seals are usually used to seal the air connections between a tractor and trailer ... two of them and lug bolt and 3 quarts of oil later and your back on the interstate ... hopefully before the EPA shows up and makes you clean up the oil slick you created when you drain plug fell out. But that's not what I want to talk to you about.

There is a problem with patching stuff and rigging stuff so it will work. Sometimes it works TOO well. Several months ago I was on my way home from Mainly Foreign. I took the back roads for a change of scenery. In "downtown" Chickamauga THE light (there's only one light in "downtown" Chickamauga) turned red. Stepped on the clutch pedal . . . something snapped . . . Homer kept right on going . . .

Luckily, my dad had made me learn to drive without a clutch (in the same truck that I did my drive shaft repair on 30 something years later). I drove over to Kyle's. I knew between the two of us and my parts bus that's at his place we could get Homer back on the road. It wasn't the clutch cable that broke like I had suspected. It was the pin that holds it to the pedal lever. I ended up cutting a short piece out of a toggle bolt and putting a self-locking nut on both ends. I had to take the clutch cable loose on the clutch end, pull it through the front, hook it to the pedals and then put it all together. It worked fine, BUT it should have been a temporary fix until I could get a new cable and pin. The pin had worn down thin and snapped, and the hole it went through in the pedal was about to break through too. The cable also hung up in the bowden tube like it was frayed ... but I kept working with it and finally got it to work. At this point I have no doubt that it will work for a day or two until I can get a new cable and pin. That was at least 6 months ago.

I ordered a cable and pin last night. It broke in the parking lot at work yesterday evening. The parts set me back less than \$10. I'll probably end up paying twice that for the "expedited, next day" shipping. Until it gets here, Homer is sitting.

There is nothing wrong with using your ingenuity and whatever is available to patch or rig something when you're in a bind...just take the time to FIX IT as soon as possible.
