Oscar, my '78 bus had just shown his proven stamina and reliability by driving me over 1200 miles to Tampa, FL and back here to Chattanooga, TN like a true champion. Truly, the gremlin that hitched a ride with me that day had mischief on his mind. Not just your harmless mischief, like putting Vaseline on the door handles of someone's house...more like mischief that ends up costing you more money than you would like to spend at the moment. It actually made a little plug that the factory put in the engine case over

27 years ago come loose and cause all "heck" to come loose as well. Oscar tried to warn me that something was wrong with a short convulsion and a little attention-getting dash light...the one labeled "Oil". No wonder he started screaming about his oil...when I pulled over to the side of the road, it was everywhere! The oil was in a pool underneath the engine, in spots spreading behind the bus, and in a steady line for about 100 feet behind us. Of course, I wasn't aware of exactly what havoc the gremlin had wreaked upon me until I had Oscar back home and the engine pulled. I

don't know what the gremlin's name was, but I had an apt one for him just at the tip of my tongue...

Gremlins must have different jobs and various ways of getting those jobs done. The latest one that graced my and my VWs with his presence must have been very smart. He had to have been riding around with me in my '72 Super Beetle for quite some time to think of this well-thought out bit of mischief. There was nothing wrong with the Beetle for the longest time, and then one day, the starter began acting up. I would turn the key, all the normal lights would come on, but there was no click-whirr-vroom that, up to now, happened every time the ignition was turned. The first place that I looked was at the starter itself. Maybe the gremlin removed a wire from the solenoid, Nope, All wires were in place. I then made a connection between the hot lead and the ground lead on the solenoid. Sparks and a turning over of the starter told me there was some hot power down there. How the gremlin knew to affect the one thing that I just knew wasn't a VW part was something that I didn't have an answer for. I just took the old part to the auto parts store, asked for a replacement, hooked it up, and the Beetle almost jumped forward when I finally turned the key again. Good-bye gremlin!

I hope that he has moved on to someone else's vehicle. I know that I don't want a visit from one of them for some time to come. In fact, they all can stay away for good. But if one does come back, at least the next time I will have some more gremlin-hunting skills in my toolbox of knowledge to counter its efforts to ruin my day.

Wilkswagen in the news Volkswagen to Revive Scirocco

Volkswagen AG, Europe's largest carmaker, is reviving the Scirocco hatchback coupe, using nostalgia for a model popularized in the '70s and '80s on U.S. television shows such as ``Saturday Night Live'' to win buyers.

Wolfgang Bernhard, Volkswagen brand chief. will unveil a prototype of the new car, scheduled to come to market in 2008, at a press event at Berlin's historic Tempel-Airport, the base of

the Berlin Airlift at the beginning of the Cold War.

"VW needs more emotional models aimed at the U.S. market," Adam Jonas, an analyst with Morgan Stanley in London said. "The Scirocco will help in this regard."

The Scirocco is one of 20 vehicles VW's main brand plans to bring to market in the next five years to expand into new niches. Bernhard aims in 2008 to introduce a compact sport-utility vehicle and a minivan Wolfsburg, Germany-based VW is building with DaimlerChrysler AG, where he used to work.

The carmaker in June brought back the Rabbit in the U.S., renaming its best-selling Golf model for the world's largest market.

VW will assemble the Scirocco, until now dubbed the IROC, in Palmela, Portugal, where VW builds the Eos convertible that went on sale this year.

"The Scirocco has a lot of details in combination with the Eos," said Hans-Gerd Bode, a VW spokesman. "It makes sense to do it at the same plant."

VW is working with DaimlerChrysler's Chrysler division to build a minivan that will be built and sold in North America. The minivan, which will come to market in 2008, will be based on the Dodge Caravan and ChryslerTown & Country.

"One of the most under-reported elements of Bernhard's model push is how it is aimed at broadening VW's addressable market in North America," Morgan Stanley's

Jonas said. "The compact SUV and minivan are key models."

Wilhelm Karmann GmbH, a German maker of specialty cars, built the original Scirocco for Volkswagen in Osnabrueck, Germany. Almost 796,000 Sciroccos were sold worldwide between 1974 and 1992.

The Scirocco is named for an Italian word for a warm southeast wind from the Mediterranean Sea.



Volkswagen reveals name of new compact SUV

Volkswagen announced the official name of its new compact SUV last month. The name is the *Volkswagen Tiguan*. The Tiguan shares its platform with the Rabbit and GTI hatchbacks.

Power for base models will be the same 200-hp 2.0-liter turbocharged 4 cylinder used in the GTI. The ForMotion AWD system used in both the Passat and the upcoming R32 could be standard if VW wants to position the Tiguan further upscale than typical compacts like the Toyota RAV4 and Honda CR-V, both of which offer lower-cost front-wheel-drive models. U.S. versions will get a 6-speed Direct Shift Gearbox as the sole option.

Although the Tiguan is based on the

Concept A, with the cabin showing a fairly typical dash layout. There may be upgrades added to give the Tiguan a unique look and feel compared to its Rabbit and GTI cousins. A third-

row seat won't be available, but it looks as though second-row passenger room will be generous by compact-SUV standards.

The name "Tiguan" is a made-up combination of "tiger" and "iguana." Volkswagen decided on the name after polling readers of a European automotive publication. Production doesn't begin until 2008.



Special edition models announced

Designed to create excitement and offer owners a higher degree of originality, Volkswagen has announced the production of three limited-edition models using the original specs while adding unique styling and design elements.

The Wolfsburg edition Jetta package is back with 16" wheels, sunroof, leather, cold weather package and oversized floormats. Available with a selection of color schemes, the model can be fitted with an automatic or manual transmission.

Next, the Fahrenheit GTI showcases a gorgeous and energetic new exterior color called Fahrenheit Orange by VW. Only 1200 will be produced. Each unit carries its individual number on a plaque fixed to the steering wheel. 18" wheels, Fahrenheit badging, sports suspension, sunroof, and heated leather sport seats are included.

The Fahrenheit GLI is similarly equipped though it sports a different yellow color for the exterior paint and interior trim. Only 1200 will be produced.

The New Beetle Triple White Convertible serves up a new color scheme that shows strong ties to the original Beetle ragtop. The exterior, interior and roof-boot are all finished in white, and is fitted with an automatic transmission. 3000 will be built and are to feature

17" wheels, leather steering wheel, seats and armrest, black carpeting and Sirius satellite radio.

Both the Beetle Triple White and the GTI Fahrenheit models will be available to Canadian enthusi-

asts.

VW develops all-electric powered microbus...

Volkswagen of America Electronics Research Laboratory (ERL), located in Palo Alto, California, has taken a 1964 Deluxe Microbus and retrofitted it with a collection of new technologies, including an all-electric drive powered by lithium polymer batteries.

VW ERL worked with Hybrid Technologies on the electric powertrain for the bus, which VW has named the Chameleon. Ten 30-volt batteries under the van's floor provide a range of about 100 miles. A recharge takes about 6 hours. Surfboards mounted on the roof are also lined with flexible solar panels that provide an additional source of energy to this 100% electric vehicle.

A multitude of other projects are showcased in the Chameleon, representing advancements in the topics of audio, speech, sensors, displays, navigation, and lighting, in addition to the electric drive system, batteries and solar cells.

The interior of the bus features an in-

ded capacitive touch-pads, digitally enhanced sound quality, rear seat entertainment options, and speech activated controls available throughout the cabin. The exterior houses several exciting new approaches for keyless entry, LED lighting, wide-angle parking cam-

eras, switchable glass and more.

The Volkswagen Electronics Research Laboratory intends to use the Microbus as a public relations tool to showcase the potential future of automotive electronics. The Chameleon has already been showcased in Germany to Volkswagen executives and engineers. It made its North American public debut at the AltWheels event in Boston, MA on 22 September.

Monday, July 31: We woke up early and went to the Black Mtn. art district. It was not what I thought it was going to be. I was imagin-




