This car is the VW Fanatic's Dream. She was a 2 owner car, kept, forgotten in a garage for the last 17 years, and then obtained for a "song". The previous owner bought her when she was only 1 year old (way back in 1967). She has about 130k original miles, and there were even a stack of service receipts, the original owners manual and a T3 Service manual in the glove compartment showing the kind of care that was taken all her life. The car was parked in the family's garage back in 1985 and judging from not only his accounts but the receipts from then till now this is where she pretty

Molly (as she finally whispered to me her name) is incredibly original and complete. All the trim is on the car, the hard-to-find-indecent-condition, and impossible-to-find new rear trunk liner is in perfect condition. The front trunk (or bonnet) liner is in perfect shape, and the spare tire well is completely solid, having only a tiny amount of surface rust. Even the original Single Port, Dual Carb'd 1600 Engine runs like a dream. The interior is in decent shape, showing only a fair amount of wear from 36 years of existence. 


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The Prez Says

New Volkswagen unveiled in Detroit show

Magellan: Yet another wagon/sports-utility that dwarfs most current production VWs, this monster people mover is powered by a 275-horsepower W-8 engine. Insiders say if it's approved for production, the Magellan could wear an Audi badge rather than VW.

For the largest European automaker, Volkswagen has a shockingly small amount of new product for 2002. Until the Beetle Cabriolet arrives in October, the most interesting new product is the low-volume New Beetle Turbo S, which increases the car's horsepower to 180 and adds the first VW six-speed manual transmission in the North American market.

Both the Golf/GTI and the Jetta receive new transmissions and more horsepower for 2002. Both vehicles offer the widely used 1.8-liter turbo four-cylinder engine as an option.

Few significant changes have been made to the Cabrio, the Eurovan, and the Passat.

VW.ZEN-My Excellent VW Adventure

Where Air Meets Water... It's more than just a slogan!

I don't own a "Water Cooled" VW and I kid around a lot of times with the folks who do. Sometimes I even point out that the New Beetle is not only cooled by liquid, the engine is in the front of the car, it was

designed in California, and it's built in Mexico. It'll never compare to that German engineered and built, rear engine, air cooled Beetle that



I drive. I hope you folks know that it's all in fun. And on really cold days when I'm freezing and you have heat, I'll admit that the kidding may even motivated by a tiny bit of jealousy. Of course I get over that as soon as the temperature climbs back into the mid-30s and I see that once again my trusty old Beetle has kept me just warm enough to hold off the frostbite.

When we decided to make "Where Air Meets Water" our club slogan, it was to try to bridge that huge gap that exist between the "Water Cooled" folks and the "Air Cooled" folks. That always seems to be the biggest dividing line for VWs. But lets face it . . . they are all VWs! Rather than look at the differences, why don't we take a few minutes to talk about the similarities? So, what does a Beetle manufactured in Germany in 1969 have in common with a New Beetle built in Mexico in 2001?

The VW logo of course, but do you see anything else? No, I'm not talking about the shape or even the bud vase on the dash. I'm looking deeper . . . into the very design of the mechanical systems. CV joints? OK, now we're getting somewhere. They are not identical, but yes, both have two drive axles coming out of the transaxle and there are 2 CV joints on both of them. They are driving the back wheels on the '69 and the front wheels on the 2001 . . .

but let's stop pointing out the differences! Let's look even deeper. Why don't we take a good hard look at the cooling systems, since that seems to be what everyone stresses as the main difference? A quick lesson in physics to get us started — energy and matter can't be created or destroyed, but they can change forms. That's as far as I got in physics so I'll end that lesson while I'm ahead.

First we'll look at the liquid cooled system. If you take gasoline and mix it with air, compress it and

put a spark to it, much of the matter is converted into energy. In an internal combustion engine some of that energy is harnessed as mechanical energy . . . that's what pushes your car down the road (except of course when I run out of gas, then it's ME pushing the car down the road but that's another story). Even on an efficient engine, much of the energy is wasted in the form of heat. Heat and moving precision metal parts with very close tolerances don't mix, so you have to get away from your engine to keep it from melting down or having parts break. Years ago, engineers found that the "best" way to get rid of the heat was to run liquid around the hot metal, let the liquid absorb the heat, then pump the liquid through a radiator and blow air across it and let the air carry the heat away. That's how it works in a liquid cooled engine. Air cools it. So then you could say that all VWs are air cooled, right?



Now lets talk about the air-cooled engine's cooling system. Read the paragraph above. That was an air-cooled engine. Oh, I know I didn't mention that air also blows over the pistons, cylinders and heads and removes heat from the outside, but the system above is how heat is removed from the internal components of an "air-cooled" engine. What, you don't have a radiator on your air-cooled engine? You must have one of the early prototypes then! You see back in the mid 1930s in Germany when those engineers (Dr. Porsche and company) were designing the first of VW's little air cooled boxer engines, they kept breaking crankshafts due to excessive heat. That's when they decided the best way to deal with the heat would be to let liquid absorb it and run that liquid through a radiator to dissipate it. Of course you call your coolant "OIL" and your radiator an "OIL COOLER."

So is an "air-cooled" engine liquid cooled? Is a "water cooled" engine air-cooled? Technically, the answer is "yes" to both questions. Bottom line . . . they are all VWs. How the excess heat gets tossed out into the atmosphere is just details.

PS - But MY VW was made in Germany! OK, yeah, I know . . . YOURS has heat . . . go ahead and rub it in.



Many times when a person installs a Bosch 009 distributor, they are disappointed when their car doesn't run any better, or not even as good as it did before the new distributor was installed. This is due to the ignition timing setting on a VW is totally dictated by the distributor that is installed in it, not the crank or cam. This means the timing notch on your crank pulley may not be right for the new 009 distributor you install. When poor performance occurs after installing the new distributor, some people will try to compensate by turning the distributor, trying to "time it by ear". Doing that is one of the

most harmful things that you can ever do to your VW! If you get it too high, in hot weather, you can easily burn a piston or head, or even ruin your engine. RESTORING AN ALLISON

I have just recently gotten into the VW style cars. We bought our first in the spring of 2000 and have found out that they are creatures of a different kind; simple in many ways and complex in others.

As a family we had enjoyed our Allison beach buggy for a couple of years before joining Scenic City Volks Folks in October of 2001. The club has been a great source of info. And now it is time to put that info to work.

After attending Bug-A-Palüza 3 and seeing the great VWs on hand, I knew that I wanted to attend Bug-A-Paluza.4. But not as just a spectator but as a participant too. With a year to get ready I have waited until the last minute to start the restoration.

Well, it's January 2002 and the show is just three months away. Now the adventure begins. I started with the front suspension by replacing the tie rod ends, ball joints, steering dampener, brakes, lines, and wheel cylinders. Now onto the cleaning of the gas tank. On the Allison buggy you must remove the hood to reveal the tank. This involves removing the dash and windshield. What a wreck...one color wire and entirely to many of them.

The tank is now removed and steamed. I was considering replacing it but once it was off I realized the tank was custom. I did not want the adventure of building another. The tank is cleaned and back where it belongs...not its time to change. The buggy has sat uneven in the rear since we got it, so it must be dealt with. I have never adjusted the rear torsion arms before, but after reading the manual and talking to some people that had done it, I was ready. After checking on the proper tool for the job I decided I could build one faster than I could order it. It was not all that hard to build...a little All Thread and a couple of nuts and I was in business. The tool works great and now the rear is level once again.

I have removed all the chrome lights, roll bar, seats, windshield, cleaned and painted the chassis, removed the seats and all the accessories. The only thing left on the car is the pan and body. Well, it's time to apply paint, which will take 2 to 3 weeks.
